

# Rectors Reflection - Through all the changing scenes of life

"Through all the changing scenes of life, in trouble and in joy, the praises of my God shall still my heart and tongue employ." Charles Wesley

So goes the hymn and I can't help thinking as we approach another Holy Week and Easter of the changes we have seen, and the world has seen, in the past 2 years.

Most of our practices in church have subtly changed, technology, mask wearing, how we take communion, how we interact with each other. All forced upon us by circumstances out of our control. But other things have changed too, the world order, again out of our control. It has been, and is, a time of great change. But let us not forget that Easter is a time of change, a time when the culmination of the life of Jesus of Nazareth reaches the complete fulfilment of its purpose in the Cross and Resurrection.

It's the journey that we follow from the moment the Angel appears to Mary.

A moment, a millisecond but the blink of an eye, missed by all but one. That forever time when the stars pulsed in harmony, when all the galaxies slowed in their whirling. I know that the future is a strange country that none will recognise, but we can venture into the unknown, safe in the knowledge that 'through all the changing scenes of life' God will be with us as promised as we continue to 'knit a layette' of faith and love In Jesus name.

# PRADIP "PADDY" DATTA MBE MS FRCS, retired Caithness consultant surgeon

The congregation at St. Andrew's join with many others to pay tribute to Paddy who has been a great supporter of this church. He donated this sculpture and proceeds from the sale of his autobiography have contributed to our plans to improve disabled access to the church.

Born in Calcutta (now Kolkata), Paddy was keen from an early age to enter the medical profession. His mother told him that his first words were "I want to be a doctor".



He arrived in the UK in 1967 with £1 10s in his pocket and had spells in various parts of the country before taking a job at the Bignold – despite having no idea where it was when he applied in 1980. He spent 25 years working in Wick, first at the Bignold Hospital and then at Caithness General. Paddy was very determined to gain all the right qualifications to make his way in the medical world but he experienced many set backs in trying to secure the promotions commensurate with his qualifications. He didn't want to be just an FRCS [Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons] in London – he wanted to be an FRCS in Dublin, he wanted to be an FRCS in Edinburgh... He was going to go to the top of his profession. This inspired him to offer help to others who found the same problems. Young surgeons would come from around the world to be trained by him in his adopted country.

He was also a renowned sportsman, winning multiple squash championships locally.

Paddy suffered a life-changing stroke in 2017 and was supported afterwards by his friend Loretta Reynolds, our church treasurer,

along with carers. He spent his last few months at Pentland View care home in Thurso and passed away there on Saturday 26 March at the age of 81.

In 2020 he published his memoirs, entitled The Naked Mountain Lands, a detailed and often humorous account of his life in the 50-plus years after he left his native India. Sales of the book have raised thousands of pounds for his three chosen charities.

He was described as an outstanding professional, a man of integrity and "just a great person". We at St. Andrew's were privileged to have him visiting us and being so generous to our church.

## **Update from the Climate Change Group**

So February and March have felt a bit busier on the climate change front. The charge's climate change group met on 16 Feb and spent some time really trying to pin down how to do a good carbon footprint. We also spent some time thinking about how we might be able to encourage biodiversity around our churches, in our grounds & graveyards. The good news is that the group has grown a bit, & now has members from Kilmaveonaig and St Andrews, as well as Holy Trinity. It feels really positive to be able to share our ideas & mull over the stuff that feels difficult! Our next meeting will be in April, after Easter—all welcome, if anyone's interested, please get in touch.

#### **Carbon Footprints**

We've been working on getting carbon footprints done for Holy Trinity, Kilmaveonaig and St Andrews. We also want to do one for All Saints at Kinloch Rannoch, and for the rectory.

We've found the good thing about working on the carbon footprints is partly about the process – it really helps us to understand what activities make up our carbon footprint, & what actions we might take to reduce it. We think our baseline footprint for Holy Trinity is about 14 metric tonnes of carbon a year, and the biggest part of that is energy – so we have a number of actions that we want to look at to try and get our energy usage down. But there are other areas such as waste, buying and spending money, food and drink, which we also need to think about.

We've also been looking at doing individual carbon footprints at home – there are a lot of tools out there to help with this, and some of them are really easy and straightforward. We've discovered that you do get somewhat different results from different tools, but the key bit is to understand what it is in our life that creates carbon so that we can think about what we might want to change.

It's worth knowing, perhaps, that the average carbon footprint for someone in the UK is 12 metric tonness a year – to beat climate

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change, ie to keep global warming to under 1.5 degrees by 2030, we'd need to be getting that down to about 2.5. That sounds a bit scary, 'though it isn't impossible if we think differently. But to be honest, every little bit helps - & we think the key message is that we probably shouldn't get too hung up on the numbers, but focus on thinking about how we live & what changes we can and want to make.

So we're keen to get other people to have a go at doing their own carbon footprint, so that we can begin to understand across the charge what carbon footprints are about, & maybe get a bit of a conversation going. So – please have a go! Here are some options:

- ♦ Climate hero, fun & easy to do take 5 mins: Carbon Calculator - Climate Hero
- WWF still quite easy but a bit more serious:

- Climate stewards this offers an individual calculator from the same organisation that provides the church calculator (recommended by the diocese):

# **Diocesan Climate Change Committee**

3 people from the charge attended the diocesan study morning on 24<sup>th</sup> February, which was a great event. We all picked up lots of tips and ideas – like the fact that not eating hothouse-grown tomatoes between November & May saves one tonne of carbon - & putting hippos in your toilet cistern to save water when you flush Hippo the Water Saver (hippo-the-watersaver.co.uk) saves 1.64 kgs of carbon a year. There was also a really interesting presentation about the renovation of the rectory in Aberfoyle, with a focus on making it as energy efficient as possible.

The other piece of good news is that the long-awaited SEC climate change toolkit is now out! Packed with useful information on resources, a toolkit and a template for an action plan. Here's a quote from the foreword by Mark, our Primus:

"Communities across the world are living with the devastating impacts as changes take place in the environment around them, with those

least responsible for the climate and ecological crises being affected the most. Food becomes harder to produce, sea levels rise and drought hits – to name just a few of these impacts; these are not imagined threats of the future, these are things happening now to our brothers and sisters across the world. As part of God's creation and as part of the body of Christ we have a responsibility not only for what happens on our doorstep but also for what happens to the whole of God's creation."

4. And finally, a comment about toothpaste..... conventional toothpaste in
plastic tubes presents a real problem. The
tubes are really hard to recycle as
they're usually made of different types of
plastic, often with a metal laminate –
and about half of conventional toothpastes also contain microplastics. The
alternative is toothpaste tablets, that
come in recyclable glass jars or tins.
They're generally eco-friendly and vegan



– and come in recyclable glass or tin containers. We should probably point out that there isn't much evidence about their effectiveness yet, but from a bit of research, the consensus seems to be that as long as you pick one with fluoride in it, there's no reason why they shouldn't be as effective as normal toothpaste. Some options to look at:

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#### A CUCKOO IN THE NEST?

The small stone structure on top of the west end of St Adamnan's at Kilmaveonaig is called a *Birdcage Belfry*. No prizes for guessing what it contains! But the bell is something of a cuckoo, as it was not originally intended to nest at Kilmaveonaig, but came from the Kirk at Little Dunkeld. The inscription on the bell reads:

# WILLIAME GLAS M OF LITIL DINKEL 1629

In 1629 the Rev. William Glas became the Minister there and his wife, Jean, marked the occasion by commissioning a bell from Charles Hog, a bell-founder in Edinburgh, and presented it to the Kirk. Then something went wrong at Little Dunkeld: Jean felt that her husband was "forsaking the old paths" and declared that the bell "shall never again ring for Presbyterian service." She had the bell removed and it was sold to Kilmaveonaig where it rings to this day, despite nearly being destroyed in a storm in 1883. Bells, of course, are ecumenical and will happily ring to call Christians to worship, whatever their denomination. This sentiment was beautifully expressed by Rev. Christopher Bowstead, the Priest-in-charge from 1899-1912. He got the date wrong, so here is his corrected prayer:

"...and may the one Bell, dated A.D. 1629, which calls us to service from its little turret, ever sound in our ears a Call to UNITY."
