Rectors Reflection 'to the end of time'

Already it is almost June. Ascension Day is behind us and Pentecost, when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Disciples, is upon us. This year Pentecost and World Environment Day are both celebrated on 5 June, and this feels strangely appropriate as Pentecost is all about how we engage with the world.

To follow in the footsteps of the Disciples is to live a life of love, of caring, and of honest witness to the love of God, for all creation. But I have been pondering over the last few weeks, and especially while I was ill with Covid, what it means 'to follow in the footsteps' of the disciples, what does it mean to see the world, with all its beauty and all its flaws, through the eyes of faith.

A phrase often used by Jesus kept coming to mind 'Do not be afraid' and it seemed to me that this was telling me that to follow the disciples in the way of Christ is to travel without fear wherever he may lead us.

Fear is so debilitating, fear of sickness, poverty, war, climate catastrophe and death will paralyse us into a state where we cannot move or do anything, so when Jesus tells his followers not to 'be afraid' he is not telling them there is nothing to fear, but it is that by overcoming fear that love will triumph. So we need to stand firmly against the forces of fear, against forces that whisper to us to 'stay safe', to let wrongs go unchallenged, to lose faith in the power of the Spirit to sustain and support us. The final word of Matthew's Gospel give us the reassurance that we, trying to follow in Christ's footsteps are not alone 'I am with you always' Jesus tells the disciples 'yes, to the end of time'.

God, you see, keeps faith with us even as we face the fears and challenges of this time, but we also need to keep faith with God and if we want an example of someone whose life has done just that, at this time of the Platinum Jubilee our Queen exemplifies what it means to see the world, with its beauty and flaws, and to walk with eyes of faith, love and service.

What is a Julian Meeting?

Named after Julian of Norwich, a fourteenth century mystic. Her inspired writings are sometimes used at meetings along with other material. The purpose of JM is defined as 'fostering the practice and teaching of contemplative prayer within the Christian tradition', and this accords with Julian's precept that the highest form of prayer consists in simply waiting on God.

A Julian Meeting is usually 6-15 people of various denominations, both lay people and clergy. They meet regularly in a house, church or chapel; the venue can and often does vary. A brief reading, or piece of music, leads into about 30 minutes of silent contemplative prayer.

This may be followed by a time for tea or coffee and conversation. Julian Meetings do vary. The main guidelines are that:

Each meeting is centred on contemplative prayer in the Christian tradition:

It welcomes people of all denominations;

It welcomes those seeking a place for silent prayer.

I am proposing to start a Julian Meeting in Highland Perthshire, with the first Julian Meeting happening on Wednesday 10 August from 2.30 to 3.30pm (approximately), in the Serenity Garden if fine - or in Holy Trinity if wet. 
Bishop Ian begins a Pilgrimage through the Diocese at HPLC

Safeguarding in the Highland Perthshire Linked Charge

"The witness of Scripture recognises and affirms God's love for all members of the human family and the priority given in Jesus' ministry to children and the vulnerable of society. His ministry was one of welcome for all. To be free to worship and participate in the life of the Church, people need to feel safe and included. Good safeguarding practice helps to ensure that everyone is welcome in a church community. Good safeguarding practice is part of how we value people and treat them with respect." – Scottish Episcopal Church Safeguarding Policy 2020

I am sure that we all want our communities to be places where everyone is safe and would ourselves want to feel that our community would be looking out for us if for some reason, we felt unsafe or at risk. We have a particular duty to those who are vulnerable (due to an intellectual disability, mental illness or other impairment; age or other circumstance; or because of reduced capacity, whether permanent or temporary) and cannot protect their own safety. It is all our responsibility to be alert to any signs that someone's safety has been compromised, or that they might be suffering abuse. We should also all know what to do if we suspect or discover that this has occurred.

Each of our congregations has a PVG Co-ordinator and either they or the Rector should be contacted if we suspect or discover that abuse has occurred, that someone is at risk of harm, or if a vulnerable person discloses to us that abuse has occurred (whether the abuse is said to have, or has, occurred in a church setting or not). The Co-ordinator or Rector would then pass this on the Provincial Officer for the Protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults who will advise on the next steps. It is important to simply listen when a person discloses something of this nature and not to carry out any kind of investigation on one's own terms. A written record should be made and passed on to the Co-ordinator or Rector who would provide it to the Diocesan Officer. The Diocesan and Provincial Officers will ensure that the appropriate policies and procedures are implemented.

Remember that abuse can take many forms and guises – financial/material, physical, sexual, psychological/emotional, discriminatory, institutional, neglect – and while there is not space to expound these here, **any** suspicions should be passed on. If the risk of harm or abuse is immediate, local child - or adult-protection procedures should be followed, and the necessary local services (police or social work) contacted without delay.

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Loving God, may our communities be places where all your people are safe. Help us each to be part of the creation of such an environment, that your name may be glorified and your love shared, Amen.

Update from the Climate Change Group

With our focus on Easter and a number of people catching covid, progress with our climate change agenda has been limited over the past couple of months. However, we've concluded that we need to be gentle on ourselves – we're in this for the long game, and will need to aim for slow,

steady progress towards our 2030 carbon neutral target.

However, we have been working on completing the SEC's energy footprint analyser for all four of the church buildings across the charge. The analyser looks at our energy usage across a 3-year period and calculates a baseline which will be the carbon level from which we need to reduce to zero by 2030. We need to submit these to the province by the end of May, so we'll report them in the next newsletter. Unsurprisingly, Holy Trinity has the greatest challenge in terms of energy usage, and in the short term, will be looking to install a HIVE system for more efficient control of its heating. In the longer term, however, as we approach 2030, Holy Trinity will be looking to install a more planet friendly heating source, such as an air or ground source heat pump. But there's a whole lot of work to be done before we know what that'll look like.

As we've said before, though, there are other contributors to our carbon footprints – such as how we spend our money, how we travel to and from church events and Sunday worship, and how we dispose of our waste. Plus, of course, we all have our own carbon footprint and we'll be encouraging people to think more about the changes they can make in their own lives to reduce carbon. We provided links to household carbon calculators in the last newsletter – if anyone has had a go, we'd love to hear from you!

As a group, we're conscious that not everyone is interested in climate change; and some of us may still be of the mind that it isn't that serious and that the kind of individual actions we can make won't make much difference anyway. Climate change is a difficult issue and one that very few of us can claim to be addressing completely. But it is an issue that we need to engage with. As members of a church with a 2030 zero carbon commitment, that is actively gearing up to address the issue, we don't really have a choice. And as people of God, who trust and believe in him, and marvel at the glory of creation, it's difficult to see how we can stand by and do nothing when the best knowledge we have tells us that the actions of human beings are

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causing devastation to the earth. Operation Noah, in their 2012 declaration, "Climate change and the purposes of God: a call to the church," wrote that:

"Humans, made in God's image, have unique responsibility for the well-being of creation (Genesis 1:26, 2:15). We are to care for the earth because it is gift, the product of God's love. No sparrow falls without God knowing. Humanity has always had the capacity to destroy our environment, but today we have this to an unprecedented extent. Whereas previous generations did not know the damage they were causing, we do. We must use our power wisely to promote the flourishing of future generations and the diversity of life on earth. This is the responsibility of every church and every believer."

And if you're interested in things you can do, back in January, Positive News magazine highlighted six top trends that were expected to continue through 2022:

- People moving their money and investments to financial organisations that prioritise ethics and the environment and avoid fossil fuel investments.
- People reducing their meat and dairy intake experimenting with non-dairy milk and the amazing innovations in vegan foodstuffs in our supermarkets.
- People shifting to brands that support biodiversity and practices that help restore ecosystems and communities from skincare to stationery to homeware. And trying to source locally made items.
- Sustainable fashion buying second hand or even renting clothes, and looking for items made from eco-friendly materials. Bear in mind that it takes 10,000 litres of water to make one pair of jeans!
- Circular consumption: repair, re-use and refill options, with new legislation on the 'right to repair' with a requirement to make spare parts available. New initiatives to help us swap unwanted goods and to share things with others in our communities.
- People reconnecting with nature and the outdoors, to help us balance out the stresses of life.

Let's take this seriously.
Let's try something small.
Let's be confident that we can make a difference.
