

Rector's Reflection – Endings and Beginnings Continued......

Ecclesiastes 3:1

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven"

As the days shorten we arrive at the time of year which the ancient Celtic peoples marked as Samhain (Summers End and the end of the Harvest), a time when the veil between this world and the next thinned and so was a time for remembering the ancestors and celebrating the past. We now celebrate this season with the Feast of 'All Saints' and 'All Souls', when we remember and give thanks for the lives that have gone before. Later comes Remembrance Sunday when we spend time reflecting on the lives lost in service to the country and to the values we stand for.

This year it has been exceptional poignant, when as the season rolled slowly towards autumn and the death of the year came the news of the peaceful passing of our Queen at the age of 96, bringing home to all of us I expect, the transitory nature of our lives and life itself. Personally this was also a difficult time as our family had just lost my mother-inlaw Vivian Baker aged 99. Like the Queen she had seemed a permanent fixture. It is at times like these that we need to remember that it is the way of life that all living things, whether early or late, come unto death, it is a road we must all travel and each and every life must come to an ending.

This is why endings are so important, why we need to acknowledge that all things including those we love will pass into that other country we call eternity, and why we need to ensure that what we do on earth is so important and that as the Epistle from 1 Timothy tells us, we strive to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous, and ready to share. For it is these things seen in abundance in the life of service faithfully given by Queen Elizabeth, that makes a difference in the world and shows God's love.

With endings always come new beginnings, as the Queen's reign ended, a new King, Charles III reign begins, and as we face the end of the placement of Rachael our Mixed Mode Trainee, who has been with us for the last three years, she begins a new journey as she is ordained Deacon and begins her curacy at St Mary's Dunblane. TS Eliot's first line in the 'Four Quartets' Part II East Coker' is "In my beginning is my end" the last line "In my end is my beginning,"; reading the poem we see that the poet speaks of circularity and the spiritual journey, that he and all of us must take, from eternity to eternity. Life is like that ending, beginnings in a never-ending cycle of seasons and of lives.

In the end it is how we live through that cycle and what we do with our one precious life that determines who we are and how we are remembered.

Strathtay news

St. Andrew's Church was one of the first to return in force after the pandemic – they were positively hammering at the doors. It has been good to return to worship but also to some of those activities which have both raised money for the church but also provided an opportunity for community action. The Grandtully Gala was held again and St.Andrew's cake stall was a great success as well as putting the church on the local map: the baking is famous and people flocked to the stall.

The Thrift Shop in Aberfeldy was another group activity with the congregation contributing all those items which they had stored for a couple of years as well as helping in the shop. The efficient operation of this enterprise was managed by Sue and Bill Hoare and some $\pounds1500$ was raised.

The Bishop has asked churches to look ahead to the next five years and produce a plan of action. He is aware that many churches have to be concerned about the maintenance of old buildings but that a wider sphere of action can be considered. So – it has been planned that St.Andrew's will have an awayday at the Grandtully Village Hall on 26 October to consider this challenge. The first consideration will be of the recent history of the church and the things which have gone well for St.Andrew's: things that have been a success and things which make the church a good place to be in. We are all aware that many of the congregation are over eighty and feel that they may not be around to experience the next five years – however it is hoped to benefit from their experience of past good practice to inform what may happen in the future. Climate change will be on the agenda as well as the way in which the church can be attractive to the wider community. Please pray for our deliberations.

Kilmaveonaig (the name translates from the Gaelic 'cille mo Eonaig' as the Cell of St Eonan, which is an affectionate form of Adamnan)

HPLC had a joint service on Sunday 25th to honour St Adamnan's feast day.


Saint Adamnan, also spelled Adomnan, also called Eunan, (born c. 625, County Donegal, Ire.—died 704; feast day September 23), abbot and scholar, particularly noted as the biographer of St. Columba.

Nothing is known of Adamnan's early life. In 679 he was elected abbot of lona, the ninth in succession from St. Columba, the founder. While on a visit to Northumbria, he adopted the Roman rules on the tonsure and for determining the date of Easter that had been accepted for England at the Synod of Whitby in 663/664. He failed, however, to enforce the changes at Iona. He then traveled much in Ireland to promote the observance of the Roman Easter, but he was never able to persuade his own community. At the council of Birr in County Offaly, he succeeded in ameliorating the condition of women, particularly by exempting them from military service; he also made regulations protecting children and clerics, and these reforms became known as the Law of Adamnan.

Adamnan's Vita S. Columbae, in which he describes the saint's prophecies, miracles, and visions, is one of the most important hagiographies ever written. He was also the author of De locis sanctis ("Concerning the Sacred Places"), a narrative of the pilgrimage (c. 680) made to the Holy Land by the Frankish bishop Arculf, who, forced by storms to the west coast of Britain, became Adamnan's guest. Adamnan is the subject of the Vision of Adamnan

(Fís Adamnáín), an Irish tale of the 10th or 11th century describing the glories of heaven and the sufferings of the damned as seen by his own soul.

THE BOOK GROUP

The book group started up again this September with a meeting about "The Pavilion in the Clouds" by Alexander McCall Smith. The group was started in the past by Gordon Pont and lately has been run by Lesley. It now meets on the last Tuesday of the

month in the hall at Holy Trinity at 2.30 in the afternoon. There was obviously a break during COVID but we are up and running again.

"The Pavilion in the Clouds" was chosen for this month as it is a fairly easy read but has some interesting reflections on the way in which events are seen by different people and the consequences of mistaken interpretation. Bella Ferguson is eight years old at the beginning of the story and her view of events gives rise to discussion: for instance, when her mother falls from the Pavilion in the Clouds Bella contemplates the result.

"She hurt her leg when she fell from the Pavilion in the Clouds. It is very steep below and she could have fallen for a long way – maybe a mile but I'm not sure. But the trees saved her.



Their branches stopped her going all the way to the bottom. That is probably because Jesus was watching and did not want her to die just yet. You only go to heaven when it is time for you to go. But before that time, lots of dangerous things can happen to you, and you will be all right. Miss White says this is not true. She says that God and Jesus and the Holy Ghost have more important things to do than worry about what happens to us. I am not sure who is right about this."

She also reflects on the attitudes of the Christian house servants to the lower class Hindus and quotes her governess who thinks there are many people "trapped in ignorance".

The story is concerned with Bella's attitude towards her governess, Miss White, and the judgements she makes about the relationships between the adults in her life. A decision she makes leads to various unfortunate circumstances and Bella lives with a feeling of guilt throughout her early life until a revelation later on makes things clear to her in a different way. The story therefore gives opportunities to reflect on youthful perceptions, mistakes and the guilt people may harbour.

At each meeting the book for the next month is proposed by members of the group – we will keep you informed of the choice because it would be lovely to have some more people offering their ideas.
