# Update from the HPLC climate change group

A Happy New Year to everyone! The climate group hasn't met since the last newsletter came out so there's not much new to tell you. But our next meeting is on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> Feb (7pm at Val & Agnes' house) if anyone would like to join us, we'd love to see you.

The main things we've been working on since our last meeting are: reviewing a whole lot of guidance and information that's available on the Church of England website, to see if we can learn anything: our eco tips leaflet, which should be out soon: and thinking about different heating options, exploring the option of 'heating the people' rather than the heating the buildings.

## Some Local news:

**The Pitlochry Community Garden Share**: this links people with gardens they can't work, with people who can. Volunteers work in the gardens to produce fruit and vegetables to share with each other and the wider community through the community larder at the Atholl Centre. Last year, a team of volunteer fruit pickers also picked the fruit from trees whose owners weren't able to pick it. They made apples available around the centre of Pitlochry for anyone to help themselves, and delivered 4 tons of apples to Wasted Degrees, to be turned into cider! The garden share is looking for more volunteers, if anyone is interested.

**The Sprout, Community Eco-hub** for Pitlochry and Aberfeldy area, had 45 members by December –the hope is that it will become an umbrella community organisation for other environmental groups in the area.

Pitlochry and Aberfeldy now have regular monthly **Repair Cafes** – so if you're interested in helping out, or have items that you want repaired, they can be contacted on: <u>aberfeldyrepaircafe@gmail.com</u> (meeting at Glen Lyon Coffee Roasters, Aberfeldy Business Park) and <u>https://www.facebook.com/PitlochryRepairCafe</u> (meeting at the Moulin Hall).

**Climate Cafes** will be meeting in 2023 in: the Birks Cinema Aberfeldy, 6pm on the 4<sup>th</sup> Monday of each month: and in Pitlochry library during the second week of each month, on Tuesday (at 1pm) and Thursday (at 7pm.) 6 In Pitlochry, the **Environment and Sustainability Group**, supporting theme 5 of the Community Action Plan, will be working on the Community Renewable Energy project. They will be meeting in Pitlochry library at 7pm on: 19th January, 16th February, 16th March, 20th April, 18th May and 22nd June.

#### Lent 2023:

Christian eco groups are suggesting that one of the ways that we might want to keep lent this year is by doing something extra or differently to support the environment. For example:

- Plant and tend a herb or flower as a reminder of our responsibility to steward God's earth.
- Try and eat at least one meal a week without meat or using local, sustainably farmed meat or game
- Think about what you can do to encourage biodiversity in your own garden keep an area of your garden unmowed, plant flowers that will attract bees, install bird or bat boxes
- Learn something about threatened species and habitats, and what you can do to help support and protect them: The A Rocha UK Target 25 project has great information about 25 key areas that we can learn about: <u>Target 25 - A Rocha UK</u>
- Use some of the ideas from our HPLC eco tips leaflet (see right), which should be available in all four of our churches soon.

## Some of the best places to see Snowdrops in Scotland

Where better to see snowdrops in all their fabulous glory than against a backdrop of gorgeous Scottish countryside? Scotland's snowdrop displays last throughout February and March so now is the ideal time.

#### Cambo Estate, St Andrews, Fife

Combine a woodland walk on the 70-acre Cambo Estate, which is home to the national collection of snowdrops. Open 10am to 5pm. Adults £5.50, children free.

#### West Plean House, near Stirling

Visitors can stroll into the Walled Garden and take a walk through the newly developed Azalea and Rhododendron plantings. There are also woodland walks with snowdrops and a panoramic view over seven counties. West Plean House also offers accommodation, and an excellent home produced and locally sourced breakfast, for those wishing to stay longer.

Open: 13:00 – 16:00 Cost: Adults £4, children free.

### 10 Pilmuir Road West, Forres

In early spring you might expect to see around 150 named snowdrops, some of which are very rare, at this beautiful small town garden. The garden is also managed without any use of artificial fertilisers or chemi-



cals and the owner encourages hedgehogs, toads and wild birds to control the slugs.

## The Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh

Founded in the 17th century as a physic garden, the botanic garden now it extends to four gardens each boasting a rich living collection of plants.

During the Scottish Snowdrop Festival guided tours will showcase the Royal Botanic Garden's collection of specialist snowdrops.

Tours run until March 8, between 10am and 6pm. Tickets cost  $\pounds 5$ .
