

Rector's Reflections Autumn 2025 - As the year turns



For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance... – Ecclesiastes 3:1-3

This reading from Ecclesiastes reminds us that God guides the events of our lives, and that there is a gift from God in every season, or time, that we live in. All things we live through are in the end temporary, and the transitions we constantly undergo are a reminder of the timelessness of God and the longing for the eternal that God has put in our hearts. The passage above has so much to offer us as we journey through the seasons of autumn and prepare for the darkness of winter.

Our newsletter spans all the aspects of autumn, the Season of Creation, of Harvest, the time of remembrance and the looking forward to the coming of the light of Christ into our world.

The time from summer's end to the beginning of Advent can often be busy and filled with so much, that we hardly have time to think. Children are back at school, holidays are over, harvests are gathered both agricultural and personal, plans are made. Sometimes it feels like we are on a treadmill trying to achieve everything before 'the winter storms begin'

But this season has traditional been a time for reflection and this year 2025 is surely a year when we need to reflect, as seemingly our world is struggling to cope with the effects of extreme weather events, with wars and rumours of wars, with violence, cruelty and greed. So many people live in dire poverty whist the richest just hoard more wealth. Does it seem to you that the good news of the Gospel has been drowned by the frailty of humankind

This is where our faith becomes really important, as at the turning of the year as the seasons change we recall that God, as a helpless baby, came into just such a violent and messy world, this symbolizes God's willingness to enter into the mess and chaos of human life to bring the promise of beauty and hope, just as the light and colours of autumn bring beauty and the promise of rest and refreshment to the earth to await the birth of new life in the spring. Let us use this autumn as a time for reflection and prayer for the world and all life.





Serenity Garden 2025.

There is always so much to do in the Serenity Garden that it is often easy to lose track of what we have achieved.

This year in particular has been a busy one with the re-landscaping of the area at the rear of the Celtic cross. Previously this was an overgrown and weedy stretch of shady, woodland; however with the benefit of funds that we have raised and a donation from the Distillery, we have been able to completely relandscape the area. A wood chip path now leads around the area, passing by a new garden bed



planted with predominantly white plants, some scented, some variegated, creating a peaceful and calm backdrop to the pathway; it then wends its way to a new stone 'memory cairn' where visitors are invited to add a small stone with the initials of or a message to a loved one. Already the cairn has grown in height and width with initialled stones and messages and poems inked to loved ones. The central bed at the back of the area, a new noticeboard has been erected in which we will be posting information about the Serenity Garden, the churchyard and general flora and fauna information. If anyone has something they would like to post up, please let us know. The area is



far from finished – we are planning to install a little 'musical' area for youngsters more anon!

A New Organ for Holy Trinity



Recent worshippers at Holy Trinity will know that, in addition to our tracker-action pipe organ there is now a second organ in the church. This was the home practice instrument of Barbara Rombaut who some will know was for many years organist at St Bride's RC church in Pitlochry. Barbara has recently moved to Blairgowrie and as she was sadly not able to take the organ with her, was keen that it should remain in Pitlochry. She very generously offered to give it to Holy Trinity, a gift which our Vestry were pleased to accept.

The organ is a 2-manual and pedals electronic instrument and has been installed at the front of the nave in a space created by rearranging some pews. As a non-mechanical organ, the manuals have a lighter touch than our pipe organ. It also has a much wider range of stops, plus many other sophisticated facilities which we can employ as we become more familiar with them.

Together with our trusty pipe organ which will continue to be maintained and played, and our Clavinova keyboard, I hope our new organ will give Holy Trinity many years' enjoyment.

HOLY TRINITY – THE CHURCHYARD

Holy Trinity has a small but interesting graveyard; four of its priests are buried in it, the last being the Revd. Derrick Burke whose grave is marked by a simple wooden cross.

The youngest to be buried, was also the first baby of 9 months - Cecil Le Poir Power who died on 29th May 1863. The oldest to be buried at Holy Trinity was Mrs Lottie Croll who died on 8th October 1985, aged 104 years. Despite her great age, Mrs Croll regularly attended services at Holy Trinity up to the time of her death.

There are a number of distinguished personnel, a Major General, three Lt Colonels, a captain of the Royal Engineers, who had been awarded the military cross for his gallantry and a Rear Admiral.

Jane Trufusis Watson-Watt, who reached the rank of Air Commandant WAAF and was also the wife of Robert Alexander Watson-Watt who succeeded her by a little over two years. Sir Robert distinguished himself by being responsible for the invention of Radar. Sir Robert was distantly related to that other Scottish genius James Watt, who pioneered the use of steam power in engineering.

Two of the original churchwardens rest here and also a later one, John Henry Dixon who was responsible for the encouragement and assistance in starting the first Scout Troup in Scotland. At the time Mr Dixon was reputed to be the oldest scoutmaster in the world; he was also interested in Japanese horticulture and was responsible for the most wonderful Japanese garden at his home.



Many others lie in this small churchyard including, from long ago a Rector's housekeeper, Doctors, a Provost of Pitlochry to tinkers and Lords of the Manor.


