### Rector's Reflections Summer 2025 'Othering'

In last Sunday's (25 May) Sermon I spoke about, the Peace that Christ offers to his Disciples and how as followers of The Way, we are called to spread that peace and serve others. And yet so many in our world today take those words and twist and manoeuvre so they fit particular political agendas. What this means in practice is failing to see the image of God in all people and failing to love our neighbours as ourselves.

There is a term for this (isn't there always) it's known as 'Othering'. Othering is a process whereby a group of people is made to seem fundamentally different, even to the point of making that group seem less than human. This process can trigger instinctive emotional reactions towards members of that group. This affects how people perceive and treat people who are part of the "in-group" versus those in the "outgroup". It leads to the stigmatisation of the out-group based on stereotypes and hierarchies, ultimately reinforcing the identity of the in-group and is used in many ways. For example, our country has a long history of the othering of foreigners, and the poem below by Michael Rosen reflects this completely, and shows us how much we rely on 'others' to support and care for us.

### Island of Strangers by Michael Rosen

for Keir Starmer and his 'Island of Strangers' (from The Guardian) – Suggested by Jean Kirby

I lay in bed hardly able to breathe but there were people to sedate me, pump air into me calm me down when I thrashed around hold my hand and reassure me play me songs my family sent in turn me over to help my lungs shave me, wash me, feed me check my medication perform the tracheostomy people on this 'island of strangers' from China, Jamaica, Brazil, Ireland India, USA, Nigeria and Greece. I sat on the edge of my bed and four people came with a frame and supported me or took me to a gym where they taught me how to walk between parallel bars or kick a balloon sat me in a wheel chair taught me how to use the exercise bike how to walk with a stick how to walk without a stick people on this 'island of strangers' from China, Jamaica, Brazil, Ireland India, USA, Nigeria and Greece.

If ever you're in need, as I was, may you have an island of strangers like I had.

As Christians we are called by Christ to overcome this mindset, we hear the words to 'love our neighbour' in Holy Communion each week, and our neighbours are all people who are irrevocably, no matter who they may be, made in God's image and despite many differences of race, gender, sexuality and culture are our brothers and sisters. The opposite of 'othering' is 'belonging'. And belonging does not insist that we are all the same. It means we recognise and celebrate our differences, in a society where "we the people" includes all the people.

In simple words let us follow Jesus and chose, like him, how we behave to 'others'.

Remember,

- He identified himself with the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, the imprisoned, and said that what we do or do not do for them is what we do or do not do for him (Mt. 25:31-46)
- He chose to touch those the law declared to be untouchable (Lk. 5:12-13).
- He let his heart and mind be changed about the extent of his ministry and mission by a Syrophoenician woman, a foreigner, an outsider, someone he had called a dog (Mk. 7:24-29).

When we fail to see God's image in all people, when we fail to call out the 'othering' of those who are different, we turn away from 'the light' that no darkness can extinguish, so let us resolve to make a conscious decision to live a life that reflects the teachings and example of Jesus Christ, seeking to live according to God's will and truth.

Six of the nine in our charge were able to attend and receive their certificates from Bishop Ian, it was a wonderful evening. If anyone is interested in become an authorised Lay Minister, there are 3 roles:

Lay Worship Leaders who are authorised to lead Services of the Word (or Matins etc) and Services of Holy Communion from Reserved Sacrament. Unlike Lay Readers they are not trained or authorised to preach, or to exercise pastoral ministry, but to lead public worship in their local church. (Requires PVG) Lay Eucharistic Ministers, authorised to assist the celebrant (Priest or Lay Reader) in administering Communion (the chalice). It is a ministry which serves the communion of all with Christ and with each other. ( Does not require PVG)

**Lay Pastoral Ministers**, authorised to assist the Priest and Lay Reader in pastoral care of the congregations, visiting the sick and take Communion to those unable to come to church. A ministry of care and compassion for people in the name of Christ. (Requires PVG)

If you are interested in any or all of these roles please get in touch with Liz or Lesley, we are planning training sessions for these roles to begin in the autumn.



### New Guidebook and History of All Saints' Kinloch Rannoch

A new visitors' guidebook has been produced for the charming church of All Saints' in Kinloch Rannoch. The history of the church and the attached McDonald Mausoleum are covered and there are brand-new photographs of the buildings and windows. Few of you will probably ever have seen inside the mausoleum, so you will be able to see what lurks inside! It is actually a very pleasant and roomy interior space and contains some intriguing Delft-like ceramic tiles on the walls depicting biblical scenes.

Copies of the new guidebook will be available inside the church for purchase—you will need to borrow the church key from the Dunalastair hotel reception—or I am sure that Liz or Seònaid will take advance orders. The 14-page, full-colour booklet is just £4. Similar guidebooks are already available for Holy Trinity and Kilmaveonaig, so watch out St Andrew's—you're next!

The lovely circular west window, also depicting Our Lord as the Good Shepherd, was given by Revd John and Elizabeth Cross in thanksgiving for the years that they spent in Rannoch while living at Dalchosnie. The Latin inscription declares that in this heavenly place, the people thrive. The designer is unknown.

Stand still, I thought,


See how long you can bear that.
